DYSREGULATED STUDENTS? HELP THEM SOAR BY COMBINING ACADEMIC AND MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES INTO A SCHOOL-BASED DAY TREATMENT PROGRAM

Recent changes in our society have left us with a growing population of young children who are entering our schools unable to regulate their emotions and behaviors on a consistent basis. These dysregulated children often live in extremely traumatic environments and face challenges for securing basic needs, consistent adult support and guidance, and a stable place to live. Realizing the need for strong mental health services combined with a highly structured academic environment, Belpre Elementary joined forces with Life & Purpose Behavioral Health, a local mental health agency, to create a hybrid "day treatment" program that keeps kids in school while structuring their days in a way that their mental health issues are addressed right along with their academic issues.
